## Public invited to high school's CTE open house event

## Come see how Pardeeville students are learning future job skills

In recognition of National Career and Technical Education (CTE) Month this February, Pardeeville High School is excited to host a CTE Open House on Tuesday, Feb. 18, from 4 to 7 p.m. The event is free and open to the public.


Community members are invited to explore how Pardeeville High School is preparing students for careers in high-demand industries that require skilled workers. The open house will feature displays in the high school atrium and guided tours of the school's CTE classrooms and shop areas, giving attendees an inside look at the programs and resources available to students. Door prizes will also be awarded to participants during the event.

Pardeeville High School offers nearly 40 CTE courses across four key program areas: agri-science, technical education, business education, and health careers. Many of these courses provide students with the opportunity to earn technical college credits through partnerships with Madi-

Agri-science: Food Science Trends, Forestry and Natural Resource Management, Golf Course and Landscaping Management, Introduction to Animal Science, Advanced Biotechnology

Technical Education: 21st Century Home Maintenance, Manufacturing Technologies, Architectural Design, Introduction to Engineering, Introduction to Metal/Welding Technologies

Business Education: Web Design, Accounting, Sports and Entertainment Marketing

Health Careers: Introduction to Health Careers, Medical Terminology

#### **Mission Statement**

## Seasons may change, but our vision remains the same

If you ask anyone around about what their favorite season (or seasons) might be, it is likely that there will be a wide variety of answers. Respondents may be quick to shout out SPRING as we continue to navigate through the darkest days of winter (in spite of a record high temperature of 53 degrees on Jan. 30), but I have always taken the opportunity to enjoy the many activities available when our outdoor surroundings are consistently sub-freezing.

For example, it never ceases to amaze me how well many of our students navigate frozen surfaces while curling or rocketing on skates across Park Lake. Although I used to jump at any opportunity to go downhill skiing or play a game of hockey with my students, a distinct loss of limb dexterity and balance has caused me to reexamine this course of action while gracefully entering my mid-40's. While the lack of snow (for the second year in a row) has certainly curtailed the exhilaration of riding on my second worst investment of all time, aka snowmobile (with my ski boat edging it out and coming in first), there may still be a few snowy surprises from mother nature that await us deep into March and April. (When I was a northern Wisconsin administrator, it was common to have snow days in April, with plenty of the white stuff still on the ground through mid-May, especially deep in the woods).

As the days steadily get longer and the temperatures gradually become more conducive for all sorts of outdoor activities, I look forward to the promises and possibilities of starting new adventures. The prospect of traveling in a new direction (especially via bicycle or boat) is enough to push my wintertime propensity for procrastination onto a positive trajectory.

#### Referendum update

Speaking of seasons, the Pardeeville Area School District officially entered 'referendum season' on Jan. 13, when the Board of Education officially adopted two resolutions that will appear on the 2025 Spring Election ballot.

#### **Operational Referendum Question**

- Asks District residents for permission to exceed the State-imposed revenue limit by \$800,000, per year for three years (non-recurring) to maintain the District's current level of operations. This permission would provide additional tax revenue for the District's operating budget.
- If approved, the estimated tax increase (over the current tax mill rate) would be \$0.85 per \$1,000 of equalized property value or \$85 per year for every \$100,000 of equalized property value beginning with the December 2025 tax bills. The tax impact would occur for three years and then expires.

#### **Facilities Referendum Question**

- Asks District residents for permission to borrow a not-to-exceed amount of \$23.5 million to address district-wide capital maintenance, renovations and an addition at the Middle/High School, including cafeteria and career and technical education spaces, demolition of the Balliet building, and renovations and additions at the Elementary School for safety and security.
- If approved, the estimated tax increase (over the current tax mill rate) would be \$1.82 per \$1,000 of equalized property value or \$182 per year for every \$100,000 of equalized property value for approximately 21 years. Example: For a property having a \$350,000 equalized value, the estimated tax increase would be \$637 per year.

The District will be inviting the community to attend referendum information sessions, as well as providing additional communications and engagement opportunities to learn more about the ballot questions. #### Second graders get egg-cellent lesson on Martin Luther King Jr. Day

On Monday, Jan. 20, Mrs. Saloun's 2nd grade class at Pardeeville Elementary School took part in a thoughtful and engaging lesson to honor Martin Luther King Jr. Day, learning about equality, diversity, and the importance of treating everyone with kindness and respect.

The lesson began with a short video about the life and legacy of Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. Students discussed the injustices Dr. King and many Black Americans faced during the civil rights movement. The conversation introduced them to the concepts of fairness, empathy, and the courage it takes to stand up for what is right.

Following the discussion, Mrs. Saloun brought out a carton of eggs. The students were intrigued as they noticed how the eggs varied in appearance—some were brown, some white, some speckled, while others were larger or more oblong. Each student selected an egg and carefully cracked it open into a cup at their desk.

Once the eggs were out of their shells, the class gathered to compare them. They discovered that despite the differences in color, shape, or size on

the outside, all the eggs were the same on the inside.

This simple but powerful activity led to a meaningful discussion about how people are like eggs: we all look different on the outside, but we are the same on the inside. The students reflected on how this lesson relates to Dr. King's dream of a world where people are judged not by the color of their skin but by the content of their character.

## Kindergarten students get their hands dirty while learning about gardening

Kindergarten students at Pardeeville Elementary School dug into a special hands-on project on Jan. 23, planting their very own indoor micro-garden. Partnering with the UW Extension Office and the Columbia County Master Gardeners, the students are growing an indoor salad garden, which now takes its place on a rolling cart in the elementary cafeteria for all to see.

The Extension Office and Master Gardeners provided the young gardeners with everything needed to get started: a garden cart outfitted with a timed grow light, trays, soil, and seeds for growing edible leaves and shoots. Occasionally, the students even discover a radish forming during the growing process, which always brings excitement.

Each student took part in the plant-

ing process, carefully covering their salad vegetable seeds with soil. Within days, tiny green seedlings will begin to peek through, bringing learning opportunities as students observe changes in color and leaf shapes and explore science concepts like condensation.

Over the next six to seven weeks, the students will continue to care for the micro-garden, monitoring its growth and marveling at its progress. At the end of the growing period, the kindergarteners will harvest their garden and come together to enjoy a fresh salad featuring their hard work.

This hands-on gardening experience is not only a fun introduction to agriculture but also a chance to explore healthy eating, teamwork, and the joys of watching something grow from seed to plate.

## Pardeeville juniors will take ACT in school on March 11

Mark your calendars, this is the 11th year the state of Wisconsin is having all juniors take the ACT during the school day. Doing this eliminates many barriers for our students. Students will not have to pay for the ACT, drive to another school to take it, or spend part of a Saturday taking the test. Students will be able to use their scores for college admission and their sub scores for some placement testing. The Wisconsin Technical College System also allows students to use their ACT scores in place of the placement testing, again saving money for our students.

Pardeeville High School Juniors will take the ACT on March 11th. As always, if a student wants to retake the test, they have that opportunity, but it would be outside of school. ## Important dates for 2025-26 school year open enrollment

**February 3-April 30, 2025** – Parents must submit applications online (recommended) or directly to the non-resident school district.

**June 6, 2025** – Nonresident school districts must mail notices of approval or denial. If the application is approved, the school district must notify the parents of the specific school or program to which the pupil is assigned. If the application is denied, parents have 30 days to file an appeal.

**June 13, 2025** – Resident districts must notify applicants if the application is denied. If the application is denied, parents have 30 days to file an appeal.

June 27, 2025 – Parents of accepted applicants must notify the nonresident district if the pupil will attend the nonresident school district in the 2025-2026 school year. If the parent fails to make this notification, the nonresident district may refuse to allow the pupil to attend the district.

How and when may parents apply? The open enrollment application period for the 2025-2026 school year is from February 3-April 30, 2025. The application period closes at 4:00 p.m. on April 30, 2025. Late applications will not be accepted for any reason. Parents may apply online at http://dpi.wi.gov/oe.



## **2025 REFERENDUMS**



THANK YOU to everyone who attended Community Conversations and completed the 2024 Community Survey on long-range facility planning! Your feedback helped shape the next steps in addressing district-wide needs, and informed the Board's decision to adopt two referendum questions for the April 1 election ballot.

#### WHAT'S ON THE APRIL 1ST BALLOT?

#### QUESTION 1: OPERATING REFERENDUM | \$800,000/year for 3 years

A successful operating referendum keeps PASD operating while also reducing our reliance on short-term borrowing. This keeps more dollars in the budget to spend on programming that has a positive impact on our students.

#### QUESTION 2: FACILITIES REFERENDUM | \$23.5 million

A successful facilities referendum would allow PASD to address much-needed maintenance, renovations, and additions that cannot be completed through the district budget alone. These needs include:

- **District-wide capital maintenance**, including replacing outdated roofing and HVAC systems at the Elementary and Middle/High School, and renovations for safety and security
- Renovations at the Middle/High School, including cafeteria and career and technical education spaces (e.g. agriculture)
- Demolishing and replacing the Balliet building, which was not originally built as a school, with a Middle School addition
- Addition at the Elementary School to include an early learning classroom

#### **WHY NOW?**

#### QUESTION 1: OPERATING | \$800,000/year for 3 years

## Estimated tax impact: \$0.85 per \$1,000 of fair market property value for 3 years

An operational referendum provides tax levy revenue to support the District's annual operating budget. It addresses the inflationary impact on operating costs including salaries and benefits, utilities, insurances, technology, transportation costs, etc., and will sustain and maintain curriculum, student activities, programs and services. This revenue also reduces the District's dependence upon, and costs associated with, short-term borrowing, thereby preserving the District's solid financial position.

#### QUESTION 2: FACILITIES \$23.5 million

## Estimated tax impact: \$1.82 per \$1,000 of fair market property value for 21 years

In 2022, the District engaged with the community in formulating a strategic plan that identified Facilities and Operations as a core pillar. Through community conversations and a long-range facility planning survey throughout 2023 and 2024, community members and staff showed support for the District to explore potential solutions that prioritize food service and cafeterias, career and technical education (e.g. agriculture), adequacy of educational space, and safety, security, and accessibility.

#### What happens if only one referendum passes?

If only the operational referendum passes, PASD will have the necessary operating funds through 2028, but will not be able to address critical maintenance and facility needs. If only the facilities referendum passes, PASD will have the funds to make critical maintenance and facility needs but will not have the operating funds to support teaching and learning.



## Wrestlers finding plenty of success

The Pardeeville Bulldogs wrestling team has delivered an impressive performance in the first half of the 2024-25 season, holding its own against much larger schools in highly competitive tournaments.

The Bulldogs showcased their talent with standout finishes at several meets. On Dec. 7, Pardeeville placed fourth out of 22 teams at the Black River Falls Invite. Over the Christmas break, the Bulldogs faced one of their toughest challenges yet at the Mid-States Classic in Whitewater, where they placed ninth out of 44 teams—a significant accomplishment in such a large and competitive field.

Pardeeville won the Trailways North Conference dual meet title with a perfect 6-0 record in league dual meets, including a huge in over Markesan on Jan. 23. The win over Markesan, which was sealed with a victory by Pardeeville freshman Alec Garcia in the final match, was especially huge, as the Hornets also entered the night undefeated in conference duals.

Senior William Becker has been a force for the Bulldogs. The three-time

state qualifier entered the week of Feb. 3 with a flawless 40-1 record, which has earned him a No. 2 ranking at 190 pounds in Division 3.

Junior Kingston Galetka has also been exceptional, entering the week of Feb. 3 with a No. 2 ranking at 144 pounds in Division 3. Joining Becker and Galetka in the top rankings is senior Caleb Mackey, who is ranked third in Division 3. Mackey brought a 37-4 record into the week of Feb. 3.



#### Open Forum

Ms. Emily Kraemer spoke regarding a bus route change for her family who does not live in the Pardeeville Area School District boundaries. She advised that board that she does have a Pardeeville address, but the residence is in the Portage School District. She is asking for a bus stop at the end of their driveway. She is concerned about the safety of having children walk .3 miles to the closest bus stop that is in the Pardeeville Area School District route

#### <u>Discussion of facility Planning Progress/</u> <u>Survey Results</u>

Mr. Scott Girard from School Perceptions gave a presentation on what the survey results came back as. In total there were 547 who responded, a 16% return of survey completions that has a +/- 4.28% margin of error. Ms. Levzow talked about why the school district wanted to do the survey, which was to know what our starting point was for the needs of the schools. Dr. Heninger talked about previous experience in working with School Perceptions and does trust their process and information that they are presenting to be a great tool to aid in determining referendum needs. Mr. Breneman asked how many houses have values of \$100,000 and it was explained that was just an example dollar amount that people could look at to try to estimate their own house values and how much this would add to their taxes. Mr. Nickel explained the median value is \$190,000. Ms. Seichter asked if any comments from the survey will be made public or if it was just to the board. Mr. Landsverk asked if the construction will be bid out or if companies are already set. He just wanted to make sure the process is in place and available for all to bid. Ms. Freeman did answer his questions. Mr. Landsverk also stated to keep in mind the costs and timing of any construction process that may go forward. Ms. Freeman did go over next steps with the board and that right now is a self-reflection time to see if it wants to move forward with the possible operation and capital referendums. Mr. Schieve talked about the urgency of deciding on the referendums due to the deadlines in the end of January to get on the April Spring elections. Mr. Nickel asked about how we come to that magic dollar amount, and Mr. Girard, Ms. Freeman and Mr. Schieve stated that they will need to look at the needs of the school district, relook at the projects and try to update plans to lower those numbers. Mr. Holland talked about building plans that were different on the survey then what was presented at the community meetings, and making what they thought were big concerns to a-la-carte items to choose from. The board will go forward into exploring an operational and facilities referendum.

#### Administrative Team Reports

Mr. Hees stated that he was enthused to see that students attended the math matters event. Ms. Levzow stated for all reports that there were a lot of things going on in the buildings. Ms. Levzow stated that she went to the veteran's program on 11/11/24 at the high school and it was good to see everyone who was there. Ms. Levzow also stated that she went to the play over the weekend and it was wonderful that we can showcase our students. Dr. Heninger thanked Mr. Houslet for winning the Spectrum Award of Merit from the Wisconsin School Public Relations Association for the school district on his ability to be able to communicate out to the public and families on behalf of the school district. Ms. Walker also stated that she went to the veteran's program at the high school and it went very well. Ms. Walker also stated that the Elementary School's fall family fun night was a success. Mr. Bellis stated that it was great to see that the Elementary School had an incredible turnout for parent/teacher conferences, and he liked that they were able to survey the families afterwards on their experience and express that they feel that their students are safe in the building.

Dr. Heninger went over the State report card for the 2022-2023 school year. Mr. Hees asked why DPI changed the calculations and Dr. Heninger answered the question with information that he knew.

Review of Annual Safety Drill Reports

Ms. Levzow talked about the different components of the safety drill reports and was glad to see we prepare our staff and students with this drill every year. Mr. Bellis said the reports were great and asked if the middle school and high school students were told ahead of time about the drill, to which Ms. Denure answered stating that per guidance from their resources it is best to tell the students and families ahead of time to not cause undue panic or stress.

Discussion on Referendum for April 2025 Mr. Schieve from Groth and Mr. Zutz from Findorff did a presentation to update the board on possible new plans for a referendum due to the survey results. They recapped the survey results, talked about the capital maintenance that is needed of \$9.1 million that is part of the base plan figures. They revamped the base plans for facility upgrades and additions, showing an estimate of \$25 million dollars that includes that capital maintenance. This would include a smaller renovation/addition at the elementary school, the Balliet building being torn down and new construction for classrooms at the middle school, as well as a new kitchen and cafeteria area in the high school to add more space for the middle school cafeteria. Ms. Levzow stated that trying to pass a \$25 million dollar referendum will be a challenge. She was hoping to see with the new plans that the dollar amount would be lower and not more. Mr. Hees asked if there is a better way to use funds, to which Findorff answered. Mr. Nickel stated that he still wants to see revised plans that address more of the needs to figure out what those expenses would be. Ms. Walker asked about more clarity on each of the costs for the capital maintenance entailed, suggesting some of those items can be trimmed back if need be. Ms. Pease stated that the public will want to see the changes, and those changes need to happen where the people will see them the most. Mr. Schieve and Mr. Zutz did recap what was all talked about, knowing we need to get close to that \$20 million mark on any renovations/additions and will further refine the plans to lower costs and present them at the next board meeting on 12/16/24. The decision does need to be

made in January 2025 if moving forward with a capital referendum.

Ms. Levzow stated that she did attend the PABA meeting with Dr. Heninger where they did talk about the survey results and answered questions. Ms. Walker stated that she attended the play at the high school and enjoyed it.
